
STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS

We also welcomed a new member of our leadership team, Amy Humphrey. A big shout out to all of the PASIG leaders that work tirelessly on behalf of our members!!


PASIG ENGAGEMENT

The PASIG developed the Description of Fellowship Practice (DFP) for the Performing Arts, which serves as the curriculum guide for the three ABPTRFE accredited fellowship programs.
