



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

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DESCRIPTION OF SPECIALTY PRACTICE

What knowledge, skills, and attributes are required for expert practice in performing arts physical therapy? Performing Arts Physical Therapy is a subspecialty practice within orthopedic and sports physical therapy, focused on the care of dancers, musicians, vocalists, gymnasts, actors, ice skaters, and circus performers. In 2000, PASIG leader, Jennifer Gamboa led a practice analysis and created the technical report that formed the basis of the 2004 Description of Specialized Clinical Practice (DSCP) in Physical Therapy for Performing artists. In 2015, a team of PASIG leaders, led by Mariah Nierman, began the revalidation process of the DSCP and PASIG petitioned the American Board of Physical Therapy Residency and Fellowship Education (ABPTRFE) for recognition of Performing Arts as a fellowship area of practice. The Description of Fellowship Practice (DFP) for Performing Arts was published in 2016 and has been used as the basis of curriculum and program requirements for the 5 Performing Arts Fellowship Programs that have been developed over the past 10 years.

It is now time to revalidate the DFP for Performing Arts again! The revalidation team will include Laurel Daniels Abbruzzese (lead), Andrea Lasner, Marisa Hentis, Sarah Edery-Altas, and Tiffany Marulli, with guidance from the APTA/ ABPTRFE. The kickoff for the revalidation will begin August 2025 at APTA headquarters. The revalidation team will develop a Practice Analysis Plan and create a pilot survey. We will be relying on our PASIG members currently working with performing artists to inform this work. The updated DFP may include revised expectations for professional competencies and primary health conditions in performing arts. Updating the DFP at least once every 10 years helps to ensure that practitioners continue meet the demands of this evolving specialized area of practice.

PHYSICAL THERAPY CARE FOR CIRCUS ARTISTS

Over the last 15 years, participation in circus arts has grown exponentially, including an increased number of circus schools, circus entertainment companies, and circus skills training programs offered through studios and gymnastics gyms. The majority of circus artists are engaged recreationally, and have unique musculoskeletal demands, injury risks, and care needs that are not always well understood by practicing clinicians. If you are an orthopedic physical therapist, there's a good chance you'll be treating circus artists in your practice. The PASIG wants to make sure that our members are equipped for the strategic assessment and treatment of this growing population of artists.

This past March, the PASIG hosted a virtual panel, PT Care for Circus Artists, featuring: Heather Heineman, PT, DPT, OCS, WCS; Emily Scherb, PT, DPT, and Dawn Muci, DPT, SCS, ATC, co-authors of the PASIG Independent Study Course (ISC) *Clinical Management of Circus Artists.* Together, they explore physical therapy care for circus artists through the lens of orthopedics, performance demands, and patient individuality in a panel discussion led by the PASIG VP-Education Melissa Strzelinski. The accepted abstract could be a platform or poster presentation. Once your abstract is accepted, you are welcome to apply for the scholarship. Note: you must show proof of your abstract acceptance to CSM 2026, and plan to attend CSM 2026 in Anaheim, CA.

Eligibility:

- 1. Must be a DPT student in an accredited physical therapy program, or a fellow in an accredited physical therapy fellowship program when the research was conducted (not necessary to be a student or fellow when research is presented).
- 2. Abstract has been accepted to CSM.
- 3. Must plan to attend CSM.
- 4. Must be listed as an author on the presentation.
- 5. Must participate in presenting the poster/platform at CSM.

Deadline: November 30th. Criteria for selection:

- The importance of the contribution of the abstract to the physical therapy management of performing arts physical therapy.
- 2. The clinical implications derived or suggested from the abstract.
- 3. The quality of the writing.
- 4. The clarity of the clinical information/data presented.

Notification of the Award:

The recipient of the award will be notified in January (just prior to CSM for which the scholarship is being offered) by the PASIG Scholarship Chairperson, Anna Saunders [annarosemary@gmail.com].
